In a country where minorities, based upon the color better time for being of their skin, religious affiliation, physical ability, sexual orientation, or ethnicity must continually justify their claim for basic rights—I could think of no better time for being a Unitarian Universalist.

Membership at UUMAN

UUWorld reports in its latest edition, a surge in attendance at UU congregations since Trump was elected president on November 8. UU ministers feel that this increase is due to people grieving and trying to process difficult emotions, as well as the need to find like-minded people to be with in uncertain times. At UUMAN, we have seen about a Membership Chair 10 - 15 % increase in visitors since the election. We welcome each and every one of our guests and hope they are able to connect with us to meet their emotional and spiritual needs.

Since the election, I have frequently been asked "How do I become a member of the church?" Our membership requirements are as follows:

- If you are new to Unitarian Universalism, we encourage you to take one of the UU-101 classes offered three times a year. These classes allow you to build a deeper connection to members of the church as well as with other class attendees. The class will allow you to talk about your religious or spiritual journey and express your needs and expectations. Our next class is January 28, 2017. and a sign-up sheet is available at the greeter's desk (near the front entrance in the atrium).
- If you have already been a UU, or cannot take the class, make an appointment to speak with our minister, Dave Dunn for a brief membership information session.
- Make a financial pledge to the church. All members are required to make an annual financial pledge to the church in order to support the activities and maintenance of our facilities. You can speak with a member of the Stewardship team, or email them at stewardship@uuman.org.
- Sign the Membership Book. We have a New Member Ceremony on Sunday usually two to three weeks following the class where our newest members are welcomed to the congregation, and new members can sign the membership book. You can also send an email to membership@uuman.org, or speak with one of the greeters or members of the membership team to make an appointment to sign the membership book.
- Get involved with the activities going on at UUMAN as time and ability permit. You build better connections when you are involved in the activities at church, whether it's signing up for one of the many adult enrichment classes offered throughout the year, volunteering to greet or usher, becoming involved with Ministry for Youth & Children, or simply helping out from time to time as needed. The Membership team will give you a list of activities and programs to indicate your interests and make any introductions as needed to help you connect with other members and friends of UUMAN.

I personally feel that UUMAN is a wonderful place to find meaning in life and spirituality as well as connecting with like-minded people. Since joining two years ago, I've made deep connections with the members and friends of UUMAN and find a lot of value in being a member. We hope you can find your place with us as well.

UUMAN Endowment

In a Finance Committee meeting earlier this year, we discussed starting a UUMAN Endowment fund. This idea had been discussed in previous Finance meetings, but had never gone very far. Then, in early Fall of this year, Ashok Nagrani did some research and determined that we could establish an Endowment through the UUA for as little as \$2,500. Of course, we didn't have \$2,500 to really open the fund, so we put the project on the back burner.

Then in October, we learned that our beloved Rev. Cynthia Prescott named UUMAN as a beneficiary of her life insurance policy. Once we knew the amount she left us, which was \$10,400, we received general agreement from everyone on the Board and the Finance committee to use at least part of the proceeds to open the UUMAN Endowment.

At the December Finance Committee meeting, we agreed to ask the board to form an Endowment Committee, composed of three UUMAN members. Bev Jordan and Ashok Nagrani have agreed to be on the committee, whose first task will be to create a draft policy for review and approval by the Finance Committee, Program Council, and Board. The policy will outline the support structure, decision making, and usage of the UUMAN Endowment.



A Page from The Page Turners


The Page Turners is UUMAN's women's book club. We meet on the second Saturday evening of each month.


