Greetings From the Board President


Hope everyone is doing well and gearing up for Harvest Moon and the Congregational Meeting on November 17.


I wanted to take a moment and lay out the Board's main priorities for the year. The Board retreat was back in August and allowed us to discuss which items should be the main focus for the Board this year. This is not to say they are the ONLY priorities for the Board, but we wanted to ensure that we had a small number of reachable goals, so we did not spread ourselves too thin.

These are the top 3 priorities we agreed to focus on for the year:

- 1. BALANCE OF AUTHORITY/POLICIES For anyone who wondered where to go with a request or who owns which responsibilities and decision-making, we hear you. There is always a sense of confusion around "Do I need approval?" or "Who do I need to inform?" We started this last Spring Congregational meeting with a KAHOOT game, and it became clear we need clearly stated responsibilities and policies. We have been hard at work talking through these issues and we are excited to share an update and a strawman (first draft) of a sample Visual Flow-Chart at the Congregational Meeting.
- 2. **INTERIM DMCY** This is a clear priority for the Board. We are fortunate to have had the MCY Task Force step in and do such a seamless, fantastic job (thank you!!!), and this has allowed the formation of a search team led by Bob Popp. Our goal is to find someone who can step in early part of 2020.
- 3. MISSION AND VISION This has been some hard, rewarding, and truly enlightening work, and we are at the point where it is finalized, pending congregational vote on November 17 (separate announcement to come regarding voting items in advance). Elizabeth Rohan has been tireless in marshalling people and resources to arrive at our final versions of Mission and Vision Statements, and next steps include owning these across congregants and ministries and how to make these "actionable:"

UUMAN's vision is to be a vital and visible community for all, bravely working toward the day when social, economic, and environmental justice is a reality.
