In the Interim (Year 2): iWonder

Should UUMAN adopt a social media policy for UUMAN-related sites such as the two Facebook groups this congregation hosts?

I want very much to believe we're all wisely capable of staying our twitchy fingers on the computer keyboard before responding in anger or righteous indignation to a post with which we disagree wildly. However the evidence of my own behavior stands in stark contrast. I'm on Facebook in a general sort of Let's Keep in Touch way. My personal pitfall has been email, or "emauling" as I call impulsively responding to an offending message with a verbal shot across the offender's electronic bow.

This has never turned out well for me. Now I proofread every email I send, checking for potential misinterpretation or demonic auto-correct. What we say from behind the veil of print can backfire on us so easily.

Of course no hypothetical social media policy could, or should, apply to personal, private communication, including emaul. You and I must strive all by ourselves to exercise good judgment there. Nor should any such policy, however graciously worded, even appear to clamp down on the free expression of our differing convictions. So let's take those two conditions as given and proceed.

Should UUMAN adopt a social media policy for UUMAN-related sites such as the two Facebook groups this congregation hosts? This question concerns the UUMAN community as a whole, not just plugged-in individuals. Burying your computer and smartphone in the backyard (or not owning one in the first place) will not let you off the hook. What's at stake here has less to do with technology than with that revered quality of healthy, happy congregational life: right relationship. Social media etiquette and policies around it are a hot topic everywhere these days. Thanks to our freethinking religious heritage and our affirming theologies of love, compassion and diversity of belief, wonder whether we Unitarian Universalists might not be uniquely equipped to address the dilemmas of clear, mindful, ethical communication in an electronic age.

The Healthy Congregations Team (Carolyn Bommarito, Elizabeth Rohan, Dave Hudson and Ann Creech) are waiting to hear your thoughts on the question, Should UUMAN adopt a social media policy for UUMAN-related sites such as the two Facebook groups this congregation hosts? UUMAN Ministerial Search Committee News You Can Use – September 2015

Your Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) is pleased to provide you with our first installment of News You Can Use—an update on what we've been up to. We want to hear from you throughout the search process, so read on to learn how to get in touch with us.

What has the MSC been doing?

After being installed as your MSC on April 26th, we began reviewing the many resources available on the UUA website about the search process. For those of you interested, you can access the materials here: http://www.uua.org/careers/ministers/

transitions/20679.shtml. We refer often to the Settlement Handbook.

Every UU congregation in search works with a Ministerial Search Representative from the UUA; after the departure of our originally assigned representative and some dialogue with the UUA office, we were fortunate to be paired with the Reverend Marni Harmony, and were able to retreat with her on June 19-20. We learned much more about the search process and each other. Based on the knowledge of each other's strengths and interests, we determined the major roles of each of the MSC members:

We also discussed how we will make decisions as a group—which decisions will require a majority, which will require a consensus—and how to understand each other's perspective when disagreements arise, to use standards that we can all agree on, to stand aside if we are willing, and to be forthright if we feel strongly.

The MSC has met since the retreat to discuss the informational packet we'll be pulling together, our methods for communicating with you, and budget considerations.

What will happen over the next couple of months?

Listening to You

- [September through October] We will talk with each of the UUMAN staff to hear their thoughts, wishes, and concerns about our next settled minister. We will also talk with other individuals in the congregation.
- [September through October] We will distribute a congregational

survey, the purpose of which is to offer every member of the congregation the chance to express your needs and wishes for our future ministry.

 [September through October] Knowing that a survey has limitations in the kind of information it can provide, we will also conduct several cottage meetings. - [October 31-November 1] We will host a Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop, led by Keith Kron from the UUA Ministerial Transitions Office. The purpose of this workshop is to promote inclusive thinking and to help prevent unintended discrimination in the ministerial search process. The workshop is three hours long—all MSC members will attend, and anyone from UUMAN is welcome to join us. Keith will also lead us in the Sunday worship service on November 1.
- [Now through November] We will draft both our Congregational Record and an informational packet that we will share with interested candidates. The Congregational Record is our best opportunity to attract ministers' interest. The materials in our informational packet will be shared with ministers that express interest in us after having reviewed our Congregational Record. We will likely be speaking with many of you about various elements of these two important resources.
- [Now through the end of the search process] We are available throughout this process—to hear your thoughts, your concerns, answer your questions, and give you any updates we are able to offer. You can find us before and after service—we'll be the ones wearing flashing red lights! You can email us: search@uuman.org. You can leave a note in our mail drawer across from Reverend Cynthia's office in Fellowship Hall.
