#### **National Memorial for Peace and Justice**

On Saturday, January 26, we will be chartering a bus (or busses) for a trip to visit the newly-opened National Memorial for Peace and Justice and the nearby Leg-

acy Museum in Montgomery, AL.

This memorial commemorates the victims of the more than 4300 documented cases of lynching in the United States. Both the memorial and museum were conceived by the Equal Justice Initiative (EJI - https://eji.org/ ), an organization that represents incarcerated individuals who may have been wrongly convicted of crimes. EJI will provide free legal representation for any death-row inmate in Alabama.

EJI executive director Bryan Stevenson is the author of the UUA's 2015-2016 common read Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption. He also gave the Ware Lecture at the 2017 UUA General Assembly.

In his address at General Assembly, he mentioned that one of the goals of the yet-to-beopened museum was to share visible reminders of this tragic history between communities around the country and the museum. This sharing can be done primarily in two ways:

1) Installation of a historical marker in each county where a confirmed lynching took place. This marker would be provided by the museum and it is identical to a marker already installed at the memorial.

2) Soil can be collected at the site of a confirmed lynching and brought to the museum. This soil collection will be displayed at the museum.





After hearing this, I became intrigued at this idea and found a numerical county-by-county listing of lynchings in a document downloaded from the EJI website. According to the document, there was 1 lynching in Forsyth, 1 in Cobb, 3 in DeKalb and 37 in Fulton (the most for any county in Georgia).

Since I live in Cobb, I decided to do some investigating as to the story behind its singular lynching. It turns out that this story was the infamous lynching of a Jewish factory owner Leo Frank who was falsely convicted of the murder of a young girl who worked at his pencil factory.

In August of this year, I attended the unveiling of the historical marker and the dedication of a small park commemorating Leo Frank. This marker is at the northwest corner of Roswell Rd. and I-75.

After our visit to the memorial in January, may we be inspired to facilitate in the sharing of these reminders through a soil collection project. Maybe we could advocate to have a county or individual marker placed in our community.



Hopefully, these markers and the sharing of visible reminders of this tragic history will prevent us from repeating this injustice.

# Come Volunteer with us at NFCC on December 15



As most of you know, UUMAN members have been volunteering at North Fulton Community Charities (NFCC) for over 2 years now.

NFCC is a wonderful organization having an enormous positive impact in the lives of many people in the North Fulton area.

Each year, close to 10,000 individuals receive over \$1.5M in emergency financial assistance to remain stably housed; more than 26,000 food pantry orders are filled; and over 1,200 adults attend education classes in workforce readiness and life skills development at NFCC. The assistance allows more than 2,600 families to remain in their home, not in a car, storage shed, or other unsafe living conditions. More than 90% of those receiving assistance are stably housed for 90 days or more after coming to NFCC for help. Community donations and volunteers are vital to continuing our success.

Please join us as we volunteer again at NFCC December 15, from 1-3:30 pm. A Sign Up Genius will follow shortly.

In a recent poll done by George Mason University in March 2018 they determined that 70% of Americans think "Global Warming is Happening" however only 58% believe that it "Is Mostly Human-Caused"! In addition they determined that 41% are "Somewhat Worried" while 21% are "Very Worried".


